After enjoying your favorite adult beverage, just rinse the bottle, fill it with water and insert the neck into the soil of your flower pot. Presto, you have just created your own watering globe! We all must make sacrifices for our gardens in order to have an empty bottle!

Japanese Beetles

Everywhere I look today, spring is bursting forth! That means Japanese beetles won't be too far behind. I love my old scarab bracelets. The history behind scarabs dates back to ancient Egyptian times. They were associated with the sun god who was



believed to open the sky and roll the sun out every morning. The Egyptians likened this to the "dung beetle" which rolls a ball of dung to its larvae. A little bit of a stretch...

In the early 1900's, the Popillia japonica was accidentally brought to New Jersey from Japan. It's now considered an

invasive species. The adult sports a pretty, shiny green coat, but the larvae are not so handsome. They are creamy colored like most grubs, but their distinguishing features are hairs on



the abdomen. When the larvae hatches, they can ruin your lawn and skeletonize the leaves of your plants. Japanese beetles seem to avoid impatiens, lantana, nasturtium and other tender perennials that can flourish in your zone.

Usually, the adults appear in late June to July. There are a few ways to get rid of these pesky little creatures. In some cases, Neem oil helps to destroy the grubs. BT (Bacillus thuringiensis) is also used to remove Japanese beetles. BT, a biopesticide, is a bacteria that is naturally found in soil and food. It produces toxins for caterpillars and other larvae, but, according to the EPA, is considered safe for humans and

animals. It's still best to protect yourself and others when exposed to BT. So be sure to follow the directions carefully.

Another choice would be nematodes. They are in the soil



everywhere and burrow into the ground to search for grubs. If you purchase nematodes, release them in the summer when the grubs are feeding.

The safest method of Japanese beetle control is to fill a bowl with water, add a little Dawn, and hold it under the infested plant. Just brush those little pests into the soapy water. A few will fly away, but most of them will not survive.

With any luck, we can co-exist with Japanese beetles, as long as they stay away from my garden!

I LOVE MAY...

I love May. It's the month that I discover which shrubs and perennials didn't show their faces this spring. Usually by May everything has leafed out that is going to especially this spring because it has been so warm. The hellebore that I splurged on didn't come back despite a healthy show its first year. I think I planted it in a spot that was too wet because of all the rain we had. Two yarrow plants also failed to show up and one juvenile redbud lost its top.

I'm sure there are other perennials that are ghosting me, but there are two plant sales this week so I will fill in not only



identified open spots but any possible future openings also. Someone once called me a plant geek, and I am happy with that ID. I want a hardy hibiscus as one of mine succumbed to a weed eater. First I will check to see if any little leaves have shown up, but it wouldn't hurt to have another plant

standing by. Hibiscus is one of the latest plants to show up in the spring - usually late enough for me to start wondering what I did to it to make it mad.

One trick I have learned in working with plants that prefer dry locations when I don't have the perfect location is to plant them up a little so they don't sit in the wet clay. That gives them a little edge. Recently I read that a Brunnera likes rich, moist



organic soil and therein lies my problem. I have planted three in highly organic, rich soil - dry soil. I tried to remember to -14water it, but I think dry shade takes regular water to satisfy the moist part of the requirement. I try to remember that failure equals knowledge - even if it's 'don't plant that again'.

My hardy begonias spread wherever I plant them and require



that same rich, moist organic soil. The trouble with them is that they prefer to spread into the pebble path rather than back into the garden. I am not sure what to do about that. The ground orchids like the soil moist in summer and dry in winter.

That works where I am going to plant them unless we have a rainy winter.

Drought tolerant perennials include coneflowers, yarrow, agastache, spurge (euphorbia), globe thistle, lavender, catmint, Russian sage, penstemon, salvia and yucca.



Generally the shrubs that grow best in our region like average or moist soil as do most of the perennials. With our weather getting warmer every year, I give plants a little leeway on the USDA zones. We are in zone 7 and if the plant is good at least in zones 6 and 8 I don't worry. If the plant is recommended for zones 7 to 10 then I might provide some protection if we have an unusually cold winter.

I don't dwell on my failures. I just look forward to the next plant sale!
