May 30th Susan Preston, Susan Oakey, Nancy Lee, Kathy Casella, Candy Nasser, Marsha Caratelli, and Meg Winn met at **Wishing Well Park**. We did some weeding and planted a few cannah lily bulbs and also admired the

monarda, susans, and passionflower vine.

We planted summer annuals at the **Post Office**,

Redeemer Courtyard, and the Fire Station as part of National Garden Week (see Candy Nasser's report on page for details).

We have no work days scheduled for summer but do need recruits for keeping our annuals at the fire station and post office watered – see previous page for details.

Memorial Garden Project - Midlothian High School

SGC was invited to participate in refurbishing two areas at Midlothian High School that memorializes fallen folks from our community. The first area we are calling the **Snelling Learning Memorial.** It features a "U" shaped planter and a dogwood tree planted in memory of Biology teacher Beth Snelling that passed away from a stroke suffered while teaching at Midlothian. Several workdays were held to clean-up and refurbish and restore this area. The existing plants were removed and evaluated. The soil remaining in the planter was refortified with detritus from the forest around the planter, some sterilized cow manure and new garden soil. The daylilies that had been there were replanted as well as the newly



donated Linton roses and Wandering Jew plants. A plaque with Beth's name, her birth year and the year of her death has been installed at the base of the dogwood tree. In addition to the plaque a frog statue was added inside the "U" portion of the planter behind some very healthy, for now, Hosta. Finally, a parking sign was attached to the planter that read, "FROG parking, all others will be TOAD".

The second, and larger project involved the **memorial garden in the front of the building at MHS.** Dr. Abel, along with Andrew and Mark McAuliffe from Cross Creek Nursery developed a plan for improvement of this area. This garden honors anyone that passed

away during their tenure at MHŠ – student, faculty member or staff. The individual is honored with a brick with their name on it. The bricks are embedded around a centrally planted tree. Over time the pathway leading to the site for has fallen into disrepair and the pathways have deteriorated.



The original idea was that SGC would provide some of the plants that were needed through donations from our gardens and labor to help restore this special area. Cross Creek outdid themselves with their very generous community outreach and did an outstanding job completing the entire site plan over spring break. A Sweet Bay Magnolia was planted to replace a dead tree and a variety of Black-Eyed Susans, Coneflowers, and grasses were installed. All of the shrubbery were pruned. The named bricks were reset and an edge restraint was added. A walkway out to the main concrete sidewalk was added. Stone was added to refresh all the existing pathways and fresh mulch throughout the area was installed.

The Memorial Site was refurbished in time to hold a memorial ceremony on May 6 honoring Wyatt Fowler, a student that passed away in December 2023 in a car accident. His passing was what initially pushed all of us to clean this area up. Thank you to all that donated materials, plants, time, suggestions, and support to help complete these two projects.

end result was absolutely superb. Faculty Staff and Graduands were very complimentary about it which was a huge relief!


